BOS Livestock Expo Programs General Rules & Regulations

Rule Interpretation

 Interpretation and Administration of these rules will be vested in the Youth Livestock Committee, and their decision will be final. Any evidence of fraud coming to the attention of the Committee will be fully prosecuted by the law.

Entries

- Entry forms are available on the Central Florida Fair website; www.centralfloridafair.com or upon request from the: Central Florida Fair, Livestock Department, 4603 West Colonial Drive, Orlando, FL 32808, (407) 295-3247.
- All entries must be made on official entry forms or online with all information complete and accurate and accompanied by fees when applicable. All entries in the Youth Livestock Programs must be submitted via online system by the registration deadline.

Health Requirements

- A Florida Department of Agriculture State Inspector will be on the grounds to check-in all animals and accompanying papers. Animals are not to be unloaded without approval from the State Inspector on duty.
- Any violation of these rules will be grounds for disqualification of entry.
- Market animals will be required to follow the rules outlined in 5C-4- Admission of Animals for Exhibition found on the Florida Department of Agriculture Website or as set forth by the Livestock committee. Please note that the Livestock Committee rules may ask for requirements to exhibit that go beyond the FDACS requirements. Livestock Committees will not be able to require less than put in place by FDACS.
- 2026 COMMERCIAL LAYING HENS NPIP will be up to the discretion of the health inspector!

Premiums and Awards

- The BOS Livestock Expo reserves the right to alter premiums and awards, delete categories or change sponsorships.
- Premiums will be paid based on the judging reports, which must be signed by the show superintendent or clerk.
- Premiums will be mailed to the exhibitor at the address given on the official 2026 entry form. All Address Changes must be sent in writing to Jacki@centralfloridafair.com before August 1, 2026!
- If a Social Security number or Federal ID Number is not provided, the Central Florida Fair will not issue premium or sale checks.

Judges and Judging

- The decision of the judge will be final, and no appeal will be considered.
- Any exhibitor who interferes with the judging will be promptly excluded from competition; if after judging, the premiums awarded will be withheld.
- All animals must be present in the coop to be evaluated by the judge to receive premiums.

Entrance to Expo and Parking

- All livestock exhibitors must enter the Livestock Gate and park in the designated parking lots outside of the fairgrounds. Vehicles parked in non-designated areas will be towed away at the owner's expense.
- All vehicles and trailers will be parked in a remote location adjacent to or near the livestock complex.

Liability for Loss or Theft

- The owner or custodian of property of any kind brought to the fairgrounds either for exhibit or for other purposes assumes, as a condition of its admission to the grounds, all risks and/or responsibility for its loss, damage or theft.
- The Central Florida Fair, BOS Livestock Expo its officers and employees cannot and will not
 accept responsibility and liability for any damage or injury resulting from theft, fire, the elements,
 accidents, or other conditions or causes, whether to exhibits, property of exhibitor, vehicles on the
 grounds and articles left therein, and any other property of any nature whatsoever.

General

- By application for entry to the BOS Livestock Expo, each exhibitor certifies that all exhibits are in accordance with the Rules & Regulations of the BOS Livestock Expo and that the exhibitor agrees to be governed by these rules.
- Exhibitors must reside in Brevard, Orange or Seminole County
- Exhibitors must be enrolled in elementary or secondary school.
- Exhibitors must submit their Report Cards & Homeschooling Forms during registration to determine eligibility into the BOS Livestock Expo.
- Any exhibitor, parent, advisor, teacher, leader, or other, who displays unprofessional behavior toward any member of the Fair Board, Fair Management, Livestock Committee, Graders, or Judges, may be just cause for the exhibitor and their animals to be disqualified and removed from the Fairgrounds. Exhibitors may also be barred from showing at future fairs. Each person is responsible for his or her own behavior.
- Animals are restricted to a designated area of the fairgrounds and must not be taken from this
 area. Violators are liable for any damage incurred by the owner or animal.
- Names and telephone numbers of qualified local veterinarians will be available at the Livestock office. Each exhibitor is responsible for any bills incurred.
- Only animals being entered and shown at the Central Florida Fair are permitted on the fairgrounds at any time.
- Personal pets (i.e. dogs, cats, reptiles, and rodents) are strictly prohibited on fairgrounds, with the exception to official Guide Dogs/ Leader Dogs for the Blind.
- The use of tobacco products, drugs and alcoholic beverages in the livestock complex is strictly prohibited.
- Smoking is strictly prohibited in the barn.
- Failure to maintain animals and exhibit to acceptable standards and/or failure to cooperate with Fair Officials may result in premium forfeiture. Any person who violates any of the General Rules or other rules as published in the 2026 BOS Livestock Expo Premium Book will forfeit all privileges and premiums won.
- Exhibitors must show their own animal during both showmanship and show.

Exhibitor Special Needs

• It is the responsibility of the exhibitor and parent to inform Fair Management of special needs (i.e., hearing or physical disability) an exhibitor may have. Special arrangements cannot be made if Expo Management is not aware of the need.

Protests

All protests must be made in writing, must plainly state the complaint, be accompanied by a
deposit of \$50.00 (which will be forfeited if the protest is not sustained) and must be delivered to
the management within 24 hours after the cause of protest. Judging Protests will not be
entertained.

Attire (Official BOS Livestock Expo Show Ring Attire)

- · Collared shirts, pants and closed toe boots.
- Shirts must be tucked into pants.
- Pants must be on the outside of the shoes. No Skinny Jeans are permitted.
- Belts are required.
- Closed toe brown or black boots above the ankle must be worn. Athletic shoes (sneakers/tennis shoes) or boat shoes (Sperry's) are not acceptable. Poultry Exhibitors may wear solid Black Athletic shoes.

Camping

- All Campers/RVs must have a reserved camping spot through showorks in order to be allowed on the fairground campground.
- Sites only have 30- & 50-amp availability. 50 Amp hook ups are limited, must be reserved ahead of time through the Fair Office.
- Campsites are located on the grounds at a rate of \$50.00 per day, per site. Sites include Water and Electric. Pump station is located on property.
- Only self-contained units are allowed, NO TENTS! A limited number of spaces are available; therefore, reservations need to be made as early as possible. Reservations will be made upon receipt of full payment, until available spaces are filled.
- Camping Availability is limited. First come, first serve. Campers will be located near the Livestock Pavilion.

- All Livestock Camping Reservations will ONLY be made online. NO CHECKS will be accepted.

NATIONAL CODE OF SHOW RING ETHICS

IAFE (INTERNATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF FAIRS AND EXPOSITIONS)

Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall at all times conduct themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship.

Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show. In addition to the "IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics," fairs and livestock shows may have rules and regulations which they impose on the local, county, state, provincial and national levels.

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada.

The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.

Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials.

Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at fairs or livestock shows.

Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of drugs. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer and/or absolutely responsible person for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Animals not entered in an event, which culminates with the animal entering the food chain, shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state and provincial statues, regulations and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event. If the laboratory report on the chemical analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood, or other substance tested (by the approved laboratory to which it is sent) is the one taken from the animal in question. Its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise at any hearing in regard to the matter conducted by the fair or livestock show. At any time after an animal arrives on the fair or livestock show premises, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian.

Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, conformation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.

The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.

Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair, or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation, and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.

No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.

The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.

The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to have any disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show against such individuals published in any publication of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, including Fairs and Expositions and any special notices to members.

The act of entering an animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further a consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.

5C-4.0015 Definitions.

For the purposes of this chapter, the definitions in Section 585.01, F.S., and the following shall apply:

- 1. Accredited tuberculosis-free herd. As defined in Rule 5C-3.001, F.A.C.
- 2. Accredited tuberculosis-free state or zone. As defined in Rule 5C-3.001, F.A.C.
- 3. Accredited veterinarian. As defined in Rule 5C-3.001, F.A.C.
- 4. Approved livestock facility. As defined in Rule 5C-3.001, F.A.C.
- 5. Authorized Representative. An employee of the state or federal government, or a licensed veterinarian accredited by the USDA, who is authorized to conduct animal disease control and eradication activities.
- 6. Certified brucellosis-free state or area. As defined in Rule 5C-3.001, F.A.C.
- 7. Certified brucellosis-free herd. As defined in Rule 5C-3.001, F.A.C.
- 8. Classified brucellosis-Class A state or area. As defined in Rule 5C-3.001, F.A.C.
- 9. Department. As defined in Rule 5C-3.001, F.A.C.
- 10. Electronic Official Certificates of Veterinary Inspection (ECVI). An electronic certificate provided by USDA Veterinary Services Process Streamlining System or a third-party vendor approved by the United States Animal Health Association (USAHA) ECVI Data Standards Subcommittee and issued by licensed and accredited veterinarians in animal's state of origin.
- 11. Exhibition. Any fair allowing the displaying or presenting livestock, including poultry, to the general public for an animal exhibit or animal show.
- 12. Fair(s). Annual public fair as defined in F.S. 616.001, that exhibits domestic animals.

- 13. Group. One or more Animals maintained on the same premises or in contact with one another.
- 14. Isolation. Separation of individual Animals by a physical barrier in a manner that assures one Animal does
- 15. Market class. An exhibition class consisting of finished fed animals.
- 16. Official certificate of veterinary inspection (OCVI). As defined in Rule 5C-3.001, F.A.C.
- 17. Official individual identification. As defined in Rule 5C-3.001, F.A.C.
- 18. Official test. A test conducted by a licensed and accredited veterinarian with method approved by Department rules for specific disease and animal species.
- 19. Owner. The owner of the animal or herd or the owner's authorized agent.
- 20. Pseudorabies. A contagious, infectious herpesvirus, causing communicable disease of livestock and other animals also known as Aujeszky's disease or mad itch.
- 21. Recognized slaughtering establishment. As defined in Rule 5C-3.001, F.A.C.
- 22. Swine brucellosis. An infectious bacterial disease caused by Brucella suis (B. suis) biovars 1 or 3, most frequently affecting swine but able to cause disease in other animals and humans.
- 23. Terminal swine show. An exhibition market class consisting of swine that are isolated and housed separately from all other animals and designated for slaughter only channels.
- 24. Validated brucellosis-free herd, as defined in 9 CFR §78.1 (JAN 2024). This definition of validated brucellosis-free herd is hereby incorporated by reference and available online at http://www.flrules.org/Gateway/reference.asp?No=Ref-17727.

5C-4.0016 Applications, Cards, Forms, Other Official Documents Required and Fees.

- USDA. The Equine Infectious Anemia Laboratory Test VS Form 10-11 (DEC 2020), an USDA, Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS), Veterinary Service (VS) form required for submitting samples and reporting results of Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) tests. Equine Infectious Anemia Laboratory Test VS Form 10-11 (DEC 2020), as incorporated in subsection 5C-18.001(10), F.A.C.
- OCVI. Florida-licensed and accredited veterinarians may obtain the following OCVIs through the department:(a) Official Certificate of Veterinary Inspection, FDACS-09000 Rev. 06/17; for use with all species, in association with movement or sale. Cost is \$65 per book of 25 certificates. Official Certificate of Veterinary Inspection, FDACS-09000 Rev. 06/17 is incorporated by reference in Rule 5C-24.003, F.A.C.
- 3. (b) Official Equine Certificate of Veterinary Inspection, FDACS-09002 Rev. 04/17; for use with equine, in association with movement or sale. Cost is \$65 per book of 25 certificates. Official Equine Certificate of Veterinary Inspection, FDACS-09002 Rev. 04/17 is incorporated by reference in Rule 5C-24.003, F.A.C.
- 4. (c) Florida-licensed and accredited veterinarians may obtain OCVIs through electronic official certificates of veterinary inspection.
- 5. (3) Negative EIA Test Verification Card, FDACS-09160 Rev. 08/18, is an official document provided by the Department to the equine owner to show proof of a negative EIA test within the previous 12 months, for purposes other than change of ownership. The document is valid for 12 months from the date the blood was drawn and is renewable annually with an associated fee of \$5.00 per application (Card). The Negative EIA Test Verification Card may be applied for by submitting the Application for Negative EIA Test Verification Card, FDACS-09206 Rev. 10/05. Negative EIA Test Verification Card FDACS-09160 Rev. 08/18 is hereby incorporated by reference and can be found online at http://www.flrules.org/Gateway/reference.asp?No=Ref-10037. Application for Negative EIA Test Verification Card, FDACS-09206 Rev. 10/05 is hereby incorporated by reference and can be found online at http://www.flrules.org/Gateway/reference.asp?No=Ref-10038.

5C-4.0017 General Requirements, Exemptions and Limitations.

- 1. OCVI Required. Animals presented for exhibition purposes in Florida, unless specifically exempted, must be accompanied by an OCVI.
 - a. The OCVI must be complete including the breed, sex, and registration number and, if applicable, the official individual identification of each animal.
 - b. Results of a specific test requirement or herd accreditation, certification or validation number for each animal must be recorded on the OCVI with the date of the test or herd accreditation, certification or validation.
- 2. Expiration of Required OCVI.
 - a. For Florida-origin animals, an OCVI is valid for 90 days from the date of issue; or until the expiration date of any required tests, whichever is the earliest date.
 - b. For animals imported into Florida for exhibition purposes only, the OCVI is valid for 30 days.

- 3. Inspection. Prior to immediate acceptance at an exhibition, all animals presented for exhibition must be made available for inspection by an authorized representative for:
 - a. The required Official Individual Identification of the Animal; and
 - b. Clinical signs of disease including, but not limited to: caseous lymphadenitis, blisters/ulcers around the mouth, nostrils, coronary band, pinkeye, pox, scabies, lice, ringworm, atrophic rhinitis, or multiple warts that are clearly visible; and
 - c. Evidence of compliance with Animal tests and OCVI requirements, where required.
- 4. Animals Rejected for Exhibition.
 - a. Any Animal in noncompliance with Animal tests and OCVI requirements, or
 - b. Any Animal not meeting the Official Individual Identification requirements, or
 - c. Any animal which is suspected of having or showing clinical signs of dangerous transmissible, contagious or infectious disease on visual inspection, or any animal which is known to be exposed to such diseases must be:
 - 1. Immediately withdrawn from exhibition and returned to the place of origin, or
 - 2. Examined at the owner's expense, by a Florida-licensed accredited veterinarian who certifies by a signed, written statement, that the animal is free of dangerous transmissible, contagious or infectious diseases and pests. The accredited veterinarian's examination must take place within 24 hours of the initial inspection by the authorized representative.

5C-4.001 General Requirements and Limitations.

5C-4.002 Cattle or Bison.

- 1. 1.OCVI Required.
 - a. Florida-origin cattle or bison moved for exhibition must be accompanied by an OCVI dated not more than 90 days prior to exhibition.
 - b. Cattle or bison imported from other states for exhibition must be accompanied by an OCVI dated not more than 30 days prior to exhibition.
- 2. Official Identification Required. All cattle or bison entered for exhibition purposes, including market class animals, must have an official individual identification. If the breed registry and brand or tattoo are used to complete the identification requirements, then the breed registry number and brand or tattoo must be listed on the OCVI accompanying the animal to exhibition.
- 3. Testing Requirements
 - a. Tuberculosis.
 - 1. Florida-origin cattle or bison may be entered for exhibition without a tuberculin test.
 - 2. Dairy Cattle. Dairy cattle imported into Florida, may be entered for exhibition provided they have:
 - i. negative caudal fold tuberculin skin test within 60 days prior to the date of the exhibition, or;
 - ii. originate from an accredited tuberculosis-free herd in an accredited tuberculosis-free state or zone.
 - 3. Beef Cattle. Beef cattle or bison imported into Florida may be entered for exhibition provided they have:
 - negative caudal fold tuberculin skin test within 60 days prior to the date of the exhibition or:
 - ii. originate from an accredited tuberculosis-free herd or state.
 - c. Brucellosis.
 - 1. Test Required. Cattle or bison, six (6) months of age or older, must have evidence of a negative brucellosis test within 30 days prior to the date of exhibition.
 - 2. Exemption from Required Brucellosis Test.
 - i. Steers and spayed heifers; and
 - ii. Cattle or bison originating from,
 - (I) a certified brucellosis-free herd. The OCVI must show the certified herd number and the date of the last herd certification test, or;
 - (II) a classified brucellosis-free state or area, or;

- (III) Cattle or bison from non-quarantined herds originating from a classified brucellosis-Class A state or area provided that the cattle are under 18 months of age.

5C-4.003 Swine.

- 1. OCVI Required.
 - a. Florida origin swine must be accompanied by an OCVI dated not more than 90 days prior to presentation for exhibition.
 - b. Swine imported for exhibition must comply with the importation requirements set forth in Rule 5C-3.007, F.A.C. An OCVI is required for exhibition and must be dated within 30 days of entry.
- Identification. All swine, entered for exhibition purposes, including market class swine in a terminal swine show, must have official individual identification.
- 3. Tests or Certification Required for Swine.
 - Swine Brucellosis.
- 1. Florida origin swine six (6) months of age or older must test negative on an official test for swine brucellosis within 90 days prior to exhibition, or;
- 2. Originate from a validated brucellosis-free herd, or;
- 3. Originate from a commercial production swine herd as defined in subsection 5C-21.002(11), F.A.C
 - b. Pseudorabies. Florida origin swine six (6) months of age or older must test negative on an official test for pseudorabies within 90 days prior to exhibition, or;
 - Originate from a qualified pseudorabies negative herd as defined in 9 CFR §85.1 (JAN 2024), which is incorporated by reference and available online at http://www.flrules.org/Gateway/reference.asp?No=Ref-17888, or;
 - Originate from an approved commercial production swine herd as defined in Rule 5C-21.002. F.A.C.

4. Exemptions.

- a. Market class swine for exhibition in a terminal swine show are exempt from the OCVI and testing requirements provided all animals in the terminal swine show are transported directly to a recognized slaughter establishment or approved livestock facility in designated slaughter channels, within 7 days of the show date. At the end of the terminal swine show, the swine owner(s) must ensure:

 - iv. (c) All swine referenced in subsection 5C-4.003(4)(a), F.A.C., must be held in isolation and only commingled with other swine in slaughter channels until slaughtered.

5C-4.004 Poultry, Domestic Fowl or Ratites.

 - c. The animals' milk is not used for human or pet consumption in Florida.
 - d. The animals return to the state of origin within 30 days of entry into Florida, and
 - e. The animals' milk is not used for human or pet consumption in Florida.
 - i. Dairy goats that remain in Florida for more than 30 days must meet the brucellosis and tuberculosis import testing requirements in the subsection 5C-3.005(4), F.A.C.
 - ii. There are no tuberculosis or brucellosis test requirements for meat type goats, pygmy goats, or Florida-origin dairy goats.

Members Definitions

Age divisions will be based on the exhibitor's age as of September 1, 2025.

Junior: 8 -10 Intermediate: 11 -13

Senior: 14 – high school graduation

It is the responsibility of the exhibitor and parent to inform Fair Management of special needs (i.e., hearing or physical disability) an exhibitor may have.

Animal Eligibility, Exhibitor Eligibility, & Initial Tag-In

- Only members residing in the following counties Brevard, Orange and Seminole are eligible to enter.
- 2. Exhibitors must be enrolled in elementary or secondary school.
- 3. Exhibitors must submit their Report Cards & Homeschooling Forms during registration to verify eligibility.
- 4. Exhibitors may register one (1) animal at the time of Registration.
- 5. Steer, Swine, Lamb and Goat \$30 entry fee will be required after the acceptance of entry, plus \$2 online service charge.
- 6. Poultry \$60 entry fee will be required after the acceptance of entry, plus \$2 online service charge.
- Market animals will be assigned a BOS Livestock Expo sale ear tag at initial tag-in and it must not be removed.
- 8. Any Exhibitors whose ear tag falls out must contact the Chair, or Fair Office within 24 hours of the tag falling out.
- 9. Any Exhibitors whose animal's ear tag does not match that of initial tag in numbers will be fined \$50.00.
- 10. All official ID on the animal must Correspond with information on the Health Certificate.
- 11. Chapter/Club animals are not eligible currently.
- 12. All exhibitors must have adult supervision while on property.
- 13. Animals that are not properly maintained will result in possible fines and dismissal.

Market Steers:

- There will be no initial weight requirement, but all steers will be weighed at tag in and weight given to exhibitor. All Market steers are required to weigh-in at a minimum of 1000 pounds, must have an average daily gain of at least 1.75 pounds per day from initial tagging.

- Animals/ Exhibitors may be sifted at any time due to any circumstance IE) structural conformity, behavior, malnourishment, etc.

- The BOS Livestock Expo Committee will advance order all the selected chicks for each year, a different breed will be selected yearly. The Breed will not be announced until Chick Pick Up.
- Any remaining chicks will be sold after each exhibitor has picked their chicks. Additional Chicks are CASH ONLY. Price will be announced prior to pick up. Will be given in a First come, First Serve style.
- Any Birds additionally purchased during Pick up are eligible to be leg banded.
- All sick birds or birds with external parasites will be isolated and are not eligible for competition or awards. Birds must be removed from the premises immediately.
- Poultry Exhibitors must be present at Poultry pick-up January 17, 2026.
- Poultry Exhibitors must be present at leg banding on May 9, 2026. All animals must be dry, clean and arrive in a cage for banding.

Tack Space

- All species will be given designated spaces in the barn to house and keep tack. These will be assigned by the BOS committee.
- For safety reasons, no overhead structures will be allowed over the animals or tack spaces. No
 additional flooring will be added to the tack space (ie; platforms, raised porches, wood paneling,
 etc.) The only acceptable flooring will be indoor/outdoor carpet in the tack space. No benches,
 chairs or structures of any kind will be allowed in the public or animal walkways.
- No hay bags, toys or other items in cages, pins or stalls.
- All Market animal species are required to provide their own cleaning supplies, hay, feed and water buckets.

This is a TERMINAL LIVESTOCK AUCTION. ALL ANIMALS (expect Poultry) will go directly to an approved licensed slaughter facility. NO OTHER TRANSPORTATION IS ALLOWED. NO EXCEPTIONS WILL BE GRANTED.

- All exhibitors must be present for sale.
- A four percent (4%) sales commission will be deducted from the sale of each animal to cover the sales expense.
- Sale order is as follows: Commercial Laying Hens, Market Goat, Market Lamb. A 15 min intermission then Market Steer and Market Swine.
- No product allowed on animals on sale day.
- Market swine will be paid up to 300lbs
- Exhibitors must be in their pen for the sale. Failure to comply will result in the animal being sold to the packer at packer price.
- No animal may leave the fairgrounds without a release paper from the livestock office.
- Removal of ear tags is strictly prohibited. Ear tags are to be left in the all animals for purposes of identification at load out and at the slaughter facility
- Add ons will be accepted the day of sale ONLY.
- Any animal sold at the auction and condemned at slaughter by a State Inspector will be the financial responsibility of the exhibitor. The sale money will be forfeited by the exhibitor, and the buyer will be refunded.
