## Central Florida Fair Youth Livestock Programs General Rules & Regulations

## Rule Interpretation

• Interpretation and Administration of these rules will be vested in the Youth Livestock Committee and their decision will be final. Any evidence of fraud coming to the attention of the Committee will be fully prosecuted of the law.

## **Entries**

- Entry forms are available on the Central Florida Fair website; www.centralfloridafair.com or upon request from the: Central Florida Fair, Livestock Department, 4603 West Colonial Drive, Orlando, FL 32808, (407) 295-3247.
- All entries must be made on official entry forms or online with all information complete and accurate and accompanied by fees when applicable. All entries in the Youth Livestock Programs must be submitted via online system by the registration deadline.

## **Health Requirements**

- A Florida Department of Agriculture State Inspector will be on the grounds to check-in all animals and accompanying papers. Animals are not to be unloaded without approval from the State Inspector on duty.
- Any violation of these rules will be grounds for disqualification of entry.
- Market animals will be required to follow the rules outlined in 5C-4- Admission of Animals for Exhibition found on the Florida Department of Agriculture Website or as set forth by the Livestock committee. Please note that the Livestock Committee rules may ask for requirements to exhibit that go beyond the FDACS requirements. Livestock Committees will not be able to require less than put in place by FDACS.
- ALL Breeding Beef, Goats, & ALL Sheep must be covered by an official Health Certificate issued by an accredited veterinarian, dated within 90 days of the exhibition date. NO EXCEPTIONS!
- Rabbits, Cavies, & Poultry DO NOT NEED A HEALTH CERTIFICATE!
- 2026 COMMERCIAL LAYING HENS NPIP will be up to the discretion of the health inspector!
- ALL Purebred Poultry is required to have NPIP! NPIP Testing will be available at Check In through the State Health Inspectors.

## **Premiums and Awards**

- The Central Florida Fair reserves the right to alter premiums and awards, delete categories or change sponsorships.
- Premiums will be paid based on the judging reports, which must be signed by the show superintendent or clerk.
- Premiums will be mailed to the exhibitor at the address given on the official 2026 entry form. All Address Changes must be sent in writing to Jacki@centralfloridafair.com before March 30, 2026!
- If a Social Security number or Federal ID Number is not provided, the Central Florida Fair will not issue premium or sale checks.

## Judges and Judging

- The decision of the judge will be final, and no appeal will be considered.
- Any exhibitor who interferes with the judging will be promptly excluded from competition; if after judging, the premiums awarded will be withheld.
- All animals must be present in the coop to be evaluated by the judge to receive premiums.

## Exhibitor Tickets/Credentials/Admission

• Each exhibitor will be issued an official livestock exhibitor wristband to be worn for the duration of his or her respective check in date. Each exhibitor will be issued Ten (10) single day admission tickets (tickets will be given at check in) to be used. Please Note: All tickets will be single day admission tickets. Be sure to utilize your tickets to cover every day you are at the fair. No additional tickets will be issued.

- Livestock 11-day passes will be available for purchase for Central Florida Fair 4-H/FFA family members at the fair website (Limit 8 per family). Please note after January 31, 2026 these tickets will NOT be available for purchase and individual full priced entry tickets will be required.
- The Fair strongly encourages exhibitors to purchase advance discount tickets for those who send tickets to their respective buyers. Tickets may be purchased online or in the Fair Office, prior to opening day.
- Buyers who PURCHASED AN ANIMAL(S) at the 2025 Central Florida Fair will receive an Invitation Letter from the Fair to purchase animals again along with two (2) Fair tickets.

## Entrance to Fair and Parking

- All livestock exhibitors must enter the Livestock Gate and park in the designated parking lots outside
  of the fairgrounds. Vehicles parked in non-designated areas will be towed away at the owner's
  expense.
- All vehicles and trailers will be parked in a remote location adjacent to or near the livestock complex.

## Liability for Loss or Theft

- The owner or custodian of property of any kind brought to the fairgrounds either for exhibit or for other purposes assumes, as a condition of its admission to the grounds, all risks and/or responsibility for its loss, damage or theft.
- The Central Florida Fair, its officers and employees cannot and will not accept responsibility and liability for any damage or injury resulting from theft, fire, the elements, accidents, or other conditions or causes, whether to exhibits, property of exhibitor, vehicles on the grounds and articles left therein, and any other property of any nature whatsoever.

#### General

- By application for entry to the Central Florida Fair, each exhibitor certifies that all exhibits are in accordance with the Rules & Regulations of the Central Florida Fair and that the exhibitor agrees to be governed by these rules.
- Only bona-fide Central Florida youth agricultural organizations or FFA members residing in/or attending schools in the following counties Brevard, Lake, Orange, Osceola, Seminole, and Volusia are eligible to enter.
- Exhibitors must meet grade level requirements and be active in a 2025-2026 youth agricultural organization (FFA or 4-H). The youth organization must be affiliated with a National Organization. "BREED" Associations DO NOT meet the requirements of the Central Florida Fair Youth Livestock Programs.
- Exhibitors must be enrolled in elementary or secondary school.
- Exhibitors must submit their Report Cards & Homeschooling Forms no later than February 4, 2026 via the Submission Link on the CFF Website. Link will be open January 1 for the SEMESTER 1 Report Cards. The first semester includes both 1st and 2nd nine weeks grades and semester exams if required, for the 2025-2026 school year. An official report card that exhibits grades for the preceding semester is the ONLY acceptable evidence allowed for entry. The Report Card must clearly state the Exhibitor's First & Last Name and School Name on it. Report Cards not submitted by deadline will deem the exhibitor ineligible to exhibit at the Central Florida Fair.
- Exhibitors shall conform to the following standards in academics (cumulative grades are not considered): For FINAL ENTRY, the exhibitor must have received a 2.0 UNWEIGHTED GRADE POINT AVERAGE FOR THE FIRST SEMESTER. The first semester includes both 1st and 2nd nine weeks grades and semester exams if required, for the 2025-2026 school year. An official report card that exhibits grades for the preceding semester is the ONLY acceptable evidence allowed for entry. The Report Card must clearly state the Exhibitor's First & Last Name and School Name on it.
- Academic Exception forms must be completed by the Principal, Guidance Counselor, or County 4-H
  Agent. Academic Exception forms must be submitted via submission link no later than February 4,
  2026.
- Any exhibitor, parent, advisor, teacher, leader, or other, who displays unprofessional behavior toward
  any member of the Fair Board, Fair Management, Livestock Committee, Graders, or Judges, may
  be just cause for the exhibitor and their animals to be disqualified and removed from the
  Fairgrounds. Exhibitors may also be barred from showing at future fairs. Each person is responsible

for his or her own behavior.

- Animals are restricted to a designated area of the fairgrounds and must not be taken from this area. Violators are liable for any damage incurred by the owner or animal.
- Names and telephone numbers of qualified local veterinarians will be available at the Livestock office. Each exhibitor is responsible for any bills incurred.
- Only animals being entered and shown at the Central Florida Fair are permitted on the fairgrounds at any time.
- Personal pets (i.e. dogs, cats, reptiles, and rodents) are strictly prohibited on fairgrounds, with the exception to official Guide Dogs/ Leader Dogs for the Blind.
- The use of underage tobacco products, drugs and alcoholic beverages in the livestock complex is strictly prohibited.
- Smoking is strictly prohibited in the barn.
- Failure to maintain animals and exhibit to acceptable standards and/or failure to cooperate with Fair Officials may result in premium forfeiture. Any person who violates any of the General Rules or other rules as published in the 2026 Central Florida Fair Youth Livestock Premium Book will forfeit all privileges and premiums won.

## **Exhibitor Special Needs**

- It is the responsibility of the exhibitor and a parent to inform Fair Management of special needs (i.e., hearing or physical disability) an exhibitor may have. Special arrangements cannot be made if Fair Management is not aware of the need.
- Exhibitors with an IEP need to provide an accommodation sheet if applicable via IEP Submission Link on our website by February 4, 2026.

### **Protests**

• All protests must be made in writing, must plainly state the complaint, be accompanied by a deposit of \$50.00 (which will be forfeited if the protest is not sustained) and must be delivered to the management within 24 hours after the cause of protest. Judging Protests will not be entertained.

## Attire (Official Central Florida Fair Show Ring Attire)

- Official dress for FFA is as defined in the official manual (note the comments below regarding shoes and pants). Skirts are not allowed.
- Other agricultural youth organization members must wear black pants (NO BLUE JEANS), a white, long sleeved button up shirt with a collar.
- Shirts must be tucked into pants.
- Pants must be on the outside of the shoe. No Skinny Jeans are permitted.
- Belts & Bolos/Ties are required.
- Closed toe brown or black boots above the ankle must be worn. Athletic shoes (sneakers/tennis shoes) or boat shoes (Sperry's) are not acceptable. Poultry Exhibitors may wear solid Black Athletic shoes.
- No hats may be worn.

## Camping

- All Campers/RV's must have a reserved camping spot through showorks in order to be allowed on the fairground's camparound.
- Sites only have 30 & 50 amp availability. 50 Amp hook ups are limited, must be reserved ahead of time through the Fair Office.
- Campsites are located on the grounds at a rate of \$25.00 per day, per site. Sites include Water and Electric. A Pump Service will be available to schedule.
- Only self-contained units are allowed, NO TENTS! A limited number of spaces are available; therefore, reservations need to be made as early as possible. Reservations will be honored upon receipt of full payment, until available spaces are filled.
- Camping Availability is limited. First come, first serve. Campers will be located near the Livestock Pavilion.

- All Livestock Camping Reservations will ONLY be done online. NO CHECKS will be accepted.

# NATIONAL CODE OF SHOW RING ETHICS IAFE (INTERNATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF FAIRS AND EXPOSITIONS)

Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall at all times conduct themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship.

Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show. In addition to the "IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics," fairs and livestock shows may have rules and regulations which they impose on the local, county, state, provincial and national levels.

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada.

The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

- 1. All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.
- 2. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials.
- 3. Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at fairs or livestock shows.
- 4. Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of drugs. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer and/or absolutely responsible person for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Animals not entered in an event, which culminates with the animal entering the food chain, shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state and provincial statues, regulations and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event. If the laboratory report on the chemical analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood, or other substance tested (by the approved laboratory to which it is sent) is the one taken from the animal in question. Its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample

was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise at any hearing in regard to the matter conducted by the fair or livestock show. At any time after an animal arrives on the fair or livestock show premises, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian.

- 5. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, conformation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.
- 6. The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.
- 7. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair, or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation, and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.
- 8. No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.
- 9. The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.
- 10. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to have any disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show against such individuals published in any publication of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, including Fairs and Expositions and any special notices to members.
- 11. The act of entering an animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further a consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.

#### 5C-4.0015 Definitions.

For the purposes of this chapter, the definitions in Section 585.01, F.S., and the following shall apply:

- (1) Accredited tuberculosis-free herd. As defined in Rule 5C-3.001, F.A.C.
- (2) Accredited tuberculosis-free state or zone. As defined in Rule 5C-3.001, F.A.C.
- (3) Accredited veterinarian. As defined in Rule 5C-3.001, F.A.C.
- (4) Approved livestock facility. As defined in Rule 5C-3.001, F.A.C.
- (5) Authorized Representative. An employee of the state or federal government, or a licensed veterinarian accredited by the USDA, who is authorized to conduct animal disease control and eradication activities.
  - (6) Certified brucellosis-free state or area. As defined in Rule 5C-3.001, F.A.C.
  - (7) Certified brucellosis-free herd. As defined in Rule 5C-3.001, F.A.C.
  - (8) Classified brucellosis-Class A state or area. As defined in Rule 5C-3.001, F.A.C.
  - (9) Department. As defined in Rule 5C-3.001, F.A.C.
- (10) Electronic Official Certificates of Veterinary Inspection (ECVI). An electronic certificate provided by USDA Veterinary Services Process Streamlining System or a third-party vendor approved by the United States Animal Health Association (USAHA) ECVI Data Standards Subcommittee and issued by licensed and accredited veterinarians in animal's state of origin.
- (11) Exhibition. Any fair allowing the displaying or presenting livestock, including poultry, to the general public for an animal exhibit or animal show.
  - (12) Fair(s). Annual public fair as defined in F.S. 616.001, that exhibits domestic animals.
  - (13) Group. One or more Animals maintained on the same premises or in contact with one another.
- (14) Isolation. Separation of individual Animals by a physical barrier in a manner that assures one Animal does not have access to the body, excrement, or discharges of another Animal; does not share a building with a common ventilation system; and is not within ten feet of another Animal.
  - (15) Market class. An exhibition class consisting of finished fed animals.
  - (16) Official certificate of veterinary inspection (OCVI). As defined in Rule 5C-3.001, F.A.C.
  - (17) Official individual identification. As defined in Rule 5C-3.001, F.A.C.
- (18) Official test. A test conducted by a licensed and accredited veterinarian with method approved by Department rules for the specific disease and animal species.
  - (19) Owner. The owner of the animal or herd or the owner's authorized agent.
- (20) Pseudorabies. A contagious, infectious herpesvirus, causing communicable disease of livestock and other animals also known as Aujeszky's disease or mad itch.
  - (21) Recognized slaughtering establishment. As defined in Rule 5C-3.001, F.A.C.
- (22) Swine brucellosis. An infectious bacterial disease caused by Brucella suis (B. suis) biovars 1 or 3, most frequently affecting swine but able to cause disease in other animals and humans.
- (23) Terminal swine show. An exhibition market class consisting of swine that are isolated and housed separately from all other animals and designated for slaughter only channels.
- (24) Validated brucellosis-free herd, as defined in 9 CFR §78.1 (JAN 2024). This definition of validated brucellosis-free herd is hereby incorporated by reference and available online at http://www.flrules.org/Gateway/reference.asp?No=Ref-17727.

5C-4.0016 Applications, Cards, Forms, Other Official Documents Required and Fees.

- (1) USDA. The Equine Infectious Anemia Laboratory Test VS Form 10-11 (DEC 2020), an USDA, Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS), Veterinary Service (VS) form required for submitting samples and reporting results of Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) tests. Equine Infectious Anemia Laboratory Test VS Form 10-11 (DEC 2020), as incorporated in subsection 5C-18.001(10), F.A.C.
- (2) OCVI. Florida-licensed and accredited veterinarians may obtain the following OCVIs through the department:
- (a) Official Certificate of Veterinary Inspection, FDACS-09000 Rev. 06/17; for use with all species, in association with movement or sale. Cost is \$65 per book of 25 certificates. Official Certificate of Veterinary Inspection, FDACS-09000 Rev. 06/17 is incorporated by reference in Rule 5C-24.003, F.A.C.
- (b) Official Equine Certificate of Veterinary Inspection, FDACS-09002 Rev. 04/17; for use with equine, in association with movement or sale. Cost is \$65 per book of 25 certificates. Official Equine Certificate of Veterinary Inspection, FDACS-09002 Rev. 04/17 is incorporated by reference in Rule 5C-24.003, F.A.C.
- (c) Florida-licensed and accredited veterinarians may obtain OCVIs through electronic official certificates of veterinary inspection.
- (3) Negative EIA Test Verification Card, FDACS-09160 Rev. 08/18, is an official document provided by the Department to the equine owner to show proof of a negative EIA test within the previous 12 months, for purposes other than change of ownership. The document is valid for 12 months from the date the blood was drawn and is renewable annually with an associated fee of \$5.00 per application (Card). The Negative EIA Test Verification Card may be applied for by submitting the Application for Negative EIA Test Verification Card, FDACS-09206 Rev. 10/05. Negative EIA Test Verification Card FDACS-09160 Rev. 08/18 is hereby incorporated by reference and can be found online at <a href="http://www.flrules.org/Gateway/reference.asp?No=Ref-10037">http://www.flrules.org/Gateway/reference.asp?No=Ref-10037</a>. ### 5C-4.0017 General Requirements, Exemptions and Limitations.

- (1) OCVI Required. Animals presented for exhibition purposes in Florida, unless specifically exempted, must be accompanied by an OCVI.
- (a) The OCVI must be complete including the breed, sex, and registration number and, if applicable, the official individual identification of each animal.
- (b) Results of a specific test requirement or herd accreditation, certification or validation number for each animal must be recorded on the OCVI with the date of the test or herd accreditation, certification or validation.
  - (2) Expiration of Required OCVI.
- (a) For Florida-origin animals, an OCVI is valid for 90 days from the date of issue; or until the expiration date of any required tests, whichever is the earliest date.
  - (b) For animals imported into Florida for exhibition purposes only, the OCVI is valid for 30 days.
- (3) Inspection. Prior to immediate acceptance at an exhibition, all animals presented for exhibition must be made available for inspection by an authorized representative for:
  - (a) The required Official Individual Identification of the Animal; and
- (b) Clinical signs of disease including, but not limited to: caseous lymphadenitis, blisters/ulcers around the mouth, nostrils, coronary band, pinkeye, pox, scabies, lice, ringworm, atrophic rhinitis, or multiple warts that are clearly visible; and
  - (c) Evidence of compliance with Animal tests and OCVI requirements, where required.
  - (4) Animals Rejected for Exhibition.
  - (a) Any Animal in noncompliance with Animal tests and OCVI requirements, or
  - (b) Any Animal not meeting the Official Individual Identification requirements, or
- (c) Any animal which is suspected of having or showing clinical signs of dangerous transmissible, contagious or infectious disease on visual inspection, or any animal which is known to be exposed to such diseases must be:
  - 1. Immediately withdrawn from exhibition and returned to the place of origin, or
- 2. Examined at the owner's expense, by a Florida-licensed accredited veterinarian who certifies by a signed, written statement, that the animal is free of dangerous transmissible, contagious or infectious diseases and pests. The accredited veterinarian's examination must take place within 24 hours of the initial inspection by the authorized representative.

#### 5C-4.002 Cattle or Bison.

- (1) OCVI Required.
- (a) Florida-origin cattle or bison moved for exhibition must be accompanied by an OCVI dated not more than 90 days prior to exhibition.
- (b) Cattle or bison imported from other states for exhibition must be accompanied by an OCVI dated not more than 30 days prior to exhibition.
- (2) Official Identification Required. All cattle or bison entered for exhibition purposes, including market class animals, must have an official individual identification. If the breed registry and brand or tattoo are used to complete the identification requirements, then the breed registry number and brand or tattoo must be listed on the OCVI accompanying the animal to exhibition.
  - (3) Testing Requirements.
  - (a) Tuberculosis.
  - 1. Florida-origin cattle or bison may be entered for exhibition without a tuberculin test.
  - 2. Dairy Cattle. Dairy cattle imported into Florida, may be entered for exhibition provided they have:
  - a. a negative caudal fold tuberculin skin test within 60 days prior to the date of the exhibition, or;
  - b. originate from an accredited tuberculosis-free herd in an accredited tuberculosis-free state or zone.
  - 3. Beef Cattle. Beef cattle or bison imported into Florida may be entered for exhibition provided they have:
  - a. a negative caudal fold tuberculin skin test within 60 days prior to the date of the exhibition or;
  - b. originate from an accredited tuberculosis-free herd or state.
  - (b) Brucellosis.
- 1. Test Required. Cattle or bison, six (6) months of age or older, must have evidence of a negative brucellosis test within 30 days prior to the date of exhibition.
  - 2. Exemption from Required Brucellosis Test.
  - a. Steers and spayed heifers; and
  - b. Cattle or bison originating from,
- (I) a certified brucellosis-free herd. The OCVI must show the certified herd number and the date of the last herd certification test, or;
  - (II) a classified brucellosis-free state or area, or;
- (III) Cattle or bison from non-quarantined herds originating from a classified brucellosis-Class A state or area provided that the cattle are under 18 months of age.

## 5C-4.003 Swine.

- (1) OCVI Required.
- (a) Florida origin swine must be accompanied by an OCVI dated not more than 90 days prior to presentation for exhibition.
- (b) Swine imported for exhibition must comply with the importation requirements set forth in Rule 5C-3.007, F.A.C. An OCVI is required for exhibition and must be dated within 30 days of entry.
- (2) Identification. All swine, entered for exhibition purposes, including market class swine in a terminal swine show, must have official individual identification.
  - (3) Tests or Certification Required for Swine.
  - (a) Swine Brucellosis.
- 1. Florida origin swine six (6) months of age or older must test negative on an official test for swine brucellosis within 90 days prior to exhibition, or;
  - 2. Originate from a validated brucellosis-free herd, or;
  - 3. Originate from a commercial production swine herd as defined in subsection 5C-21.002(11), F.A.C.
- (b) Pseudorabies. Florida origin swine six (6) months of age or older must test negative on an official test for pseudorabies within 90 days prior to exhibition, or;
- 1. Originate from a qualified pseudorabies negative herd as defined in 9 CFR §85.1 (JAN 2024), which is incorporated by reference and available online at <a href="http://www.flrules.org/Gateway/reference.asp?No=Ref-17888">http://www.flrules.org/Gateway/reference.asp?No=Ref-17888</a>, or ;
  - 2. Originate from an approved commercial production swine herd as defined in Rule 5C-21.002, F.A.C.
  - (4) Exemptions.

- (a) Market class swine for exhibition in a terminal swine show are exempt from the OCVI and testing requirements provided all animals in the terminal swine show are transported directly to a recognized slaughter establishment or approved livestock facility in designated slaughter channels, within 7 days of the show date. At the end of the terminal swine show, the swine owner(s) must ensure:
- 1. Swine are transported directly from the terminal swine show to the possession of a recognized slaughter establishment, within 7 days of the end of the show, or;
- 2. Swine are transported directly from the terminal swine show to the possession of an approved livestock facility in designated slaughter only channels, within 7 days of the show.
  - (b) Owners must maintain swine show records for a period of two (2) years. The records must include:
  - 1. Official individual identification of each animal, and;
- 2. Individual or business name and contact phone number of the entity transporting the swine from the terminal swine show to the recognized slaughter or approved livestock facility, and;
- 3. The name, physical address and delivery date to the recognized slaughtering establishment, or approved livestock facility where the swine were delivered.
- (c) All swine referenced in subsection 5C-4.003(4)(a), F.A.C., must be held in isolation and only commingled with other swine in slaughter channels until slaughtered. #### 5C-4.004 Poultry, Domestic Fowl or Ratites.

- (a) An OCVI is required for poultry, domestic fowl or ratites imported into Florida as specified per Rule 5C-3.012, F.A.C. An OCVI for entry into exhibition is required and must be dated within 30 days of entry or the animals must be inspected as provided in subsection 5C-4.0017(3), F.A.C.
- (b) Florida origin poultry, domestic fowl or ratites presented for exhibition must be accompanied by an OCVI dated within 90 days prior to exhibition or must be inspected as provided in subsection 5C-4.0017(33), F.A.C.
- (2) Test or Certification Required. All poultry or domestic fowl entered for exhibition must originate from Pullorum-Typhoid Clean flocks or hatcheries, as provided in 9 CFR §145 (Jan. 2018) and §147 (Jan. 2018), or have a negative pullorum-typhoid test within 90 days prior to exhibition. 9 CFR §145 (Jan. 2018) and §147 (JAN 2018) are hereby incorporated by reference and available online at <a href="http://www.flrules.org/Gateway/reference.asp?No=Ref-10045">http://www.flrules.org/Gateway/reference.asp?No=Ref-10045</a>.

#### 5C-4.005 Goats or Sheep.

- (a) Florida-origin goats or sheep presented for exhibition must be accompanied by an OCVI dated not more than 90 days prior to exhibition, except lamb or kids less than three months of age and accompanied by their dam.
- (b) Goats or sheep imported into Florida for exhibition must requirements set forth in Rule 5C-3.005, F.A.C. An OCVI is required for entry into and Exhibition and must be dated within 30 days prior to entry.
- (2) Identification. All goats or sheep entered for exhibition purposes must have official individual identification, except lambs or kids under three months of age accompanied by their dam that has official individual identification.
  - (3) Tests or Certification Required.
- (a) All dairy goats imported into the state for exhibition purposes for no more than 30 days are exempted from the import testing requirements in subsection 5C-3.005(4), F.A.C., provided:
  - 1. The animals originate from:
  - a. Accredited tuberculosis-free states or herds, and
  - b. Certified brucellosis-free herds or classified brucellosis-Class A states or areas.
  - 2. The animals return to the state of origin within 30 days of entry into Florida, and
  - 3. The animals' milk is not used for human or pet consumption in Florida.
- (b) Dairy goats that remain in Florida for more than 30 days must meet the brucellosis and tuberculosis import testing requirements in the subsection 5C-3.005(4), F.A.C.
- (c) There are no tuberculosis or brucellosis test requirements for meat type goats, pygmy goats, or Floridaorigin dairy goats.

- (2) Test or Certification Required. All Equine presented for exhibition must be accompanied by evidence of a negative official test for Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA), conducted within 12 months prior to exhibition. The negative EIA test must be reported on:
- (a) Equine Infectious Anemia Laboratory Test, VS Form 10-11 (2020), as incorporated in subsection 5C-18.001(10), F.A.C.
- (b) Negative EIA Test Verification Card, FDACS-09160 Rev. 08/18, as incorporated in subsection 5C-4.0016(3), F.A.C.
- (c) EIA reporting form approved by the USDA and another state's animal health official, including electronic EIA laboratory test. An electronic EIA laboratory test may be presented on an electronic device if:
  - 1. The electronic reporting form is in the original format and has not been altered, and
  - 2. Is of size and image quality to provide a clear, legible document; and
  - 3. The device properly displays all document information.
- (3) Exemption to Test Requirement. A foal under six (6) months of age is not required to have a negative EIA test if it is accompanied by its dam which has met the EIA test requirement.

## **INTENT & PURPOSE**

The intent of the Youth Poultry show is to promote youth development through a meaningful experience, which will help young people grow into mature adults.

#### **ANIMAL & EXHIBITOR ELIGIBILITY**

- Only bona-fide Central Florida youth agricultural organizations or FFA members residing in/or attending schools in the following counties Brevard, Lake, Orange, Osceola, Seminole, and Volusia are eligible to enter.
- 2. Exhibitors must meet grade level requirements and be active in a 2025-2026 youth agricultural organization (FFA or 4-H). The youth organization must be affiliated with a National Organization. "BREED" Associations DO NOT meet the requirements of the Central Florida Fair Youth Livestock Programs.
- 3. Exhibitors must be enrolled in elementary or secondary school.
- 4. Exhibitors must submit their Report Cards & Homeschooling Forms no later than February 4, 2026 via the Submission Link on the CFF Website. Link will be open January 1 for the SEMESTER 1 Report Cards. The first semester includes both 1st and 2nd nine weeks grades and semester exams if required, for the 2025-2026 school year. An official report card that exhibits grades for the preceding semester is the ONLY acceptable evidence allowed for entry. The Report Card must clearly state the Exhibitor's First & Last Name and School Name on it. Report Cards not submitted by deadline will deem the exhibitor ineligible to exhibit at the Central Florida Fair.
- Exhibitors shall conform to the following standards in academics (cumulative grades are not considered): For FINAL ENTRY the exhibitor must have received a 2.0 UNWEIGHTED GRADE POINT AVERAGE FOR THE FIRST SEMESTER.

- 6. Academic Exception forms must be completed by the Principal, Guidance Counselor, or County 4-H Agent. Academic Exception forms must be submitted via submission link no later than February 4, 2026.
- 7. Exhibitors must be 8 years of age by September 1, 2025 to compete.
- 8. Cloverbud Exhibitors (ages 5-7 years of age) by September 1, 2025 are ineligible to participate in competitive activities at any level. However, they may exhibit or share project activities at a participation level. Cloverbud exhibitors may only have one entry.
- Exhibitors must be under the direct supervision of their Leader/Advisor/Parent/Guardian while
  on property. Leaders MUST submit a Point of Contact Form for each species prior to check
  in.
- 10. Exhibitor must designate at time of online entry under which agricultural organization (4-H/FFA/etc.) they will conduct their project.
- 11. \$10.00 per bird entry fee is required at the time of online entry. Plus \$2 online service charge.
- 12. Double Coops are an additional \$5 per Bird. Double Coops are subject to refusal depending on space and class.
- 13. The project officially begins October 1, 2025.
- 14. The ownership deadline for Purebred Poultry is December 1, 2025.
- 15. A maximum of 10 birds per exhibitor will be accepted.
- 16. All birds must be entered by class, breed, variety, and sex and will be judged as they were entered.

  No changes will be accepted after February 4, 2026.

### **ELIGIBILITY OF ANIMAL FOR SHOW**

- 1. All sick birds or birds with external parasites will be isolated and are not eligible for competition or awards. Birds must be removed from the premises immediately.
- 2. Eligible Purebred Breeds are those recognized by the American Poultry Association Standard of Perfection and the American Bantam Association Standard of Perfection. Classes will be provided for chickens, ducks, geese and turkeys. **No crossbred poultry will be allowed.**\*\*\*PULE TO LIMITED CAGE SPACE WE WILL NOT BE ACCEPTING GUINEAS QUAL DOVES.
  - \*\*\*DUE TO LIMITED CAGE SPACE WE WILL NOT BE ACCEPTING GUINEAS, QUAIL, DOVES, PIGEONS, PHEASANTS OR PEACOCKS!\*\*\*
- 3. Poultry must be inspected as provided in **5C-4.004**.
  - a. OCVI Required. An OCVI is required for Poultry, Domestic fowl or Ratites for movement into Florida, but not specifically for exhibition. However, Poultry, Domestic fowl or Ratites presented for exhibition without an OCVI, must be inspected as provided in subsection 5C-4.0017(4), F.A.C.
  - b. Test or Certification Required. All poultry or domestic fowl entered for exhibition must originate from Pullorum-Typhoid Clean flocks or hatcheries, as provided in 9 CFR §145 (Jan. 2018) and §147 (Jan. 2018), or have a negative pullorum-typhoid test within 90 days prior to exhibition. 9 CFR §145 (Jan. 2018) and §147 (JAN 2018) are hereby incorporated by reference and available online at <a href="http://www.flrules.org/Gateway/reference.asp?No=Ref-10045">http://www.flrules.org/Gateway/reference.asp?No=Ref-10045</a>.
- 4. Animals/ Exhibitors may be sifted at anytime due to any circumstance IE) structural conformity, behavior, malnourishment, etc.
- 5. Tampering with or faking any animal entered is prohibited.
- 6. NPIP is encouraged, Birds without certificates will be checked by the Agriculture Department at fair check in.

# YOUTH LIVESTOCK SHOW ETHICS & ANIMAL CARE WORKSHOP (MANDATORY)

The Central Florida Fair believes that every youth exhibitor should receive proper training and information for raising and showing a youth animal project. All exhibitors that exhibit at the 2026 Central Florida Fair must have completed the Ethics training in order to show at the 2026 Central Florida Fair. It is important that the exhibitors understand:

- The purpose of youth livestock projects
- The importance of ethics in youth livestock projects
- Proper animal handling and management
- The difference between animal welfare and animal rights
- Be prepared to be an ambassador for animal agriculture

The Youth Livestock Show Ethics and Animal Care Workshop is designed to certify students to meet the mandatory certification requirements that will be in effect for the 2026 Central Florida Fair. Certifications are valid for three (3) Fair seasons, not 3 calendar years. For the 2025/2026 Fair Season, Certification Numbers starting with 24, 25 and 26 are current and valid.

The requirements are as follows:

1. All exhibitors that are entered in the 2026 Central Florida Fair Youth Livestock

- Programs MUST HAVE COMPLETED the ethics training to show an animal at the 2026 Central Florida Fair.
- 2. Exhibitors in good standing with a current ethics certification do not need to attend. Please make sure you are current with your certification and you will not expire prior to the 2026 Central Florida Fair.
- 3. The Central Florida Fair will host Two (2) dates for the Workshop at the Central Florida Fairgrounds. Additional workshops will be offered around the state. Check the Florida State Fair website for locations, dates and times www.floridastatefair.com

The exhibitor along with a parent or advisor will be required to complete the record book at final check in to be eligible for show and participation at the Central Florida Fair. The exhibitor will be given a 2-hour window to complete & resubmit on final check in day. Any record book deemed incomplete at resubmission will forfeit the exhibitor from participation & show at the Central Florida Fair.
- 4. The project officially begins October 1, 2025.
- 5. The ownership deadline for Purebred Poultry is December 1, 2025.
- 6. All Photos must be in color and from the current project year. Photos should not look like a scrapbook and should be kept in a square or rectangular shape.
- 7. Final Record Books must be handwritten by the exhibitor in their own words. Failure to comply is considered grounds for disqualification of the exhibitor resulting in ineligibility for show & participation in the Purebred Poultry Program.
- 8. If additional pages are needed, print a duplicate page, and add them into the book. Be sure to staple in the left-hand corner & include them in your final calculations.
- 9. Record books not submitted by the deadline will result in exhibitor disqualification from the program.
- 10. Parents and advisors/leaders are responsible for reviewing for completeness prior to signing.
- 11. Disqualified exhibitors will be notified by The Central Florida Fair.
- 12. Graded record books will be returned at the Fair.
- 13. Exhibitors must score 70 or better to receive record book recognition and/or awards.
- 14. Exhibitors will be in age divisions; junior, intermediate and senior.
- 15. Points will be earned towards Champion Exhibitor. Exhibitors receiving a zero will forfeit

competing for Champion Exhibitor.

- 16. Record books are judged on the Modified Danish System; blue, red, white
- 17. Record Books will be available for pick up Sunday at release.

## SKILL A THON (MANDATORY)

- 3. All exhibitors are required to participate in the Skill A Thon in order to show.
- 4. Failure to take the Skill A Thon will result in disqualification from the program.
- 5. Any Exhibitor unable to attend Skill A Thon must request in writing to the Livestock Manager at least 48 hours prior to Skill A Thon to be placed on the Make-up Testing List. Exhibitors must include their name, club, species, and reason for needing to be placed on the List. Placement on the list is up to the discretion of the Livestock Manager only. Record books will be accepted through Monday, February 9, 2026. Record books must be submitted to the Fair Office by Monday, February 9, 2026. All Educational posters will still be due on or before February 21, 2026 during our Skill A Thon Hours (9am-12pm). Exhibitors are permitted to have others submit items or they can turn them in early to the Fair office, by appointment only! Anything not collected by the deadline will result in the exhibitor being ineligible to show at the 2026 Central Florida Fair.
- 6. There is no time limit during the multiple choice section of the test; however there will be time limits on the hands on station to ensure movement.
- 7. Exhibitors must score 70 or better to receive Skill A Thon recognition and/or awards.
- 8. Exhibitors will be in age divisions; junior, intermediate and senior.
- 9. 2026 educational topic is the same as The Florida State Fair's, please refer to the following website for study material: http://www.floridastatefairag.com
- 10. Exhibitors will earn points toward Champion Exhibitor. Exhibitors receiving a zero will forfeit competing for Champion Exhibitor.

## **CHECK IN AT FAIR**

Wednesday, February 25, 2026 4-7 PM

- 1. NO WET BIRDS WILL BE ACCEPTED UPON ARRIVAL!
- 2. Animals with any signs of lice, mites, eggs or any other external parasites will be removed from the barn immediately & are not eligible to show.
- 3. A State Poultry Inspector will be present to test all birds upon arrival. All birds without a valid NPIP number will be given a pullorum-typhoid blood test on entry. Reactors will be taken by the Department of Agriculture and not returned to the exhibitor.
- 4. Birds will be cooped by class, breed, variety, & sex.
- 5. All exhibitors are required to water and feed their birds upon arrival.
- 6. Signs are permitted above Cages. Signs must be no larger than 4X6 inches.
- 7. Exhibitors must be present at check-in unless special permission has been requested and approved.
- 8. Management reserves the right to reject any entry or entries from any exhibitor.
- 9. It is highly recommended that each exhibitor contact the Florida Department of Agriculture to obtain their NPIP number prior to arriving at the Central Florida Fair.
- 10. There are no Pop-Up tents permitted around the Perimeter of the Barn.
- 11. Tack spaces will be assigned to clubs/Chapters only if space permits. If space permits: All tack and grooming boxes, supplies and/or feed must be kept in the assigned tack area. Exhibitors are allowed 1 Five (5) Gallon tote per exhibitor to store items. Totes must close and be contained in each clubs assigned areas. All Tack items (feed, grooming supplies, etc.) must be contained in a closed storage bin in said tack area. Wheelbarrows and Coolers are not permitted in Tack Spaces.

## CARE OF ANIMAL & QUARTERS DURING THE FAIR

- Each exhibitor is required to maintain clean and attractive quarters for his or her birds at all times.
- 2. The Central Florida Fair will furnish cages.
- 3. Exhibitors will be responsible for feed, water and have their respective cages cleaned daily.
- 4. CFF will supply cups for waterers and feeders as well as bedding.
- 5. No toys, blankets or other additional items will be allowed in the cages!
- 6. Animals must be fed, watered and have their respective pens cleaned daily.
- 7. Poultry barn closes at 10:00 PM each night.
- 8. No dogs allowed on the Fairgrounds!
- 9. The Central Florida Fair and the Poultry Committee will not be responsible for any loss that may occur but will exercise every reasonable care of exhibits.
- 10. Animals must be held securely when not in their cage and must remain in their respective designated animal areas.
- 11. All eggs are the property of the Central Florida Fair and will be removed daily by the Poultry Committee.
- 12. Leaders and Advisors will be notified if animals are not properly attended. Exhibitors are expected to be present at their designated exhibit areas.
- 13. If someone is caring for your animals please notify the Livestock office, Chair, or Co-Chairman immediately of the Exhibitor and what they are responsible for.
- 14. Exhibitors are required to have proper footwear on while inside the Livestock Barn.
- 15. Barn is open from 7am to 10pm daily. All Animals must be cared for daily & before 10am and after 6pm. Exhibitors are permitted to leave property after their animals are cared for and secured for the night. Please hat Herdsman judging does continue until Barn Close. The Herdsman Rubric can be found under the Herdsman section of this book.

## **POULTRY HERDSMAN CONTEST**

Proper herdsmanship will be upheld by all exhibitors of the Central Florida Fair. In order to ensure a proper and safe environment for our exhibits, public guests and exhibitors, all exhibitors will be in participation of the Herdsman Contest during their time at the 2026 Central Florida Fair.

This is a fun show for exhibitors and spectators alike. The intention is to exhibit originality and teamwork within the 4-H and FFA Chapters by displaying up to two members in coordinating costumes. Imagination is beneficial to our learning experiences. However, keep in mind that we are working with animals and have limited resources in a show area setting.

- 1. This contest is open to all youth exhibitors participating in the Breeding Sheep, Meat Goat, Purebred Poultry, Commercial Laying Hen, Beef Breeding & Rabbit & Cavy Programs.
- 2. Members may enter as individuals or in a group of two or three.
- 3. Teams must be a registered Exhibitor and in a coordinating costume.
- 4. Any animals used in the Fashion Show must be officially entered and processed to show in the Central Florida Fair.
- 5. Each exhibitor must submit an information summary sheet including the following information:
  - i. Names of individuals participating
  - ii. Name of 4-H or FFA Chapter.
  - iii. What the exhibitor has learned from their project.
  - iv. Why they chose their particular costume.
  - v. A short description of the entry to be read during the presentation.
- 6. All summaries are due Thursday, February 26, 2026.
- 7. All care should be taken to ensure the animals, being dressed, are not harmed or hindered from natural movement in any way by the costume. On the animal no use of glitter, paints or dyes will be allowed.
- 8. Products must be made for use on Livestock. Committee members have the right to question products being used. All animals MUST be broken down and be free of product prior to Barn Closure at 10pm. Failure to comply with rules will result in a \$100.00 fine.
- 9. Competitors in the Vintage Category must use an animal registered in the 2026 Central Florida Fair with the permission of the Exhibitor the Animal is registered to.
- 10. Awards will be given in each Age Division; all species will be combined.
- 11. Divisions include: Cloverbud, Junior, Intermediate, Senior, & Vintage

## **SHOWMANSHIP (MANDATORY)**

The animal must be set up properly, clean and trained well enough to respond to the exhibitor's commands. The exhibitors must be courteous, attentive and demonstrate knowledge of their project.

- 1. Failure to compete in Showmanship will result in a zero for Champion Exhibitor Points and forfeiting of all Premiums.
- 2. Exhibitors will be in age divisions; Cloverbud, Junior, Intermediate & Senior.
- 3. Official Central Florida Fair Show Ring Attire is required.
- 4. Exhibitors must be in the arena 15 minutes prior to the show starting for an Official Dress Check & Opening Ceremonies.
- 5. During all shows only the Judges, and Poultry Committee members are allowed inside the ring. All others will remain outside the closed off area.
- 6. Awards will be given to the top three places in each division.
- Exhibitor earns points towards champion exhibitor (no monetary premium will be paid).

- 2. Animals will be released at 4:00 PM, Sunday, March 1, 2026. NO EXCEPTIONS!
- 3. **Do not remove Coop Cards!!!** Coop Cards are to be left on all poultry for purposes of identification at load out.
- 4. Following Animal Removal, Exhibitors will be required to assist with the Breakdown Process and clean up. Record Books will be available at the conclusion of the Breakdown Process. Failure to complete this process will result in Premiums being forfeited.
- 5. For release, please see your show Chair & Co-Chair for instructions. No information for Poultry Check out will be available in the Livestock Office.
- 6. Animals removed prior to this time, without prior permission will forfeit all premium monies won.
- 7. Exhibitors must retrieve their packets at Coop Out as directed by the Chair & Co-Chair. Parents

- and Leaders may not pick up the packets without prior consent from the Chair & Co-Chair.
- 8. No Cages are permitted in the barn until release.
- 9. Premium checks take six (6) weeks to process after the Fair ends and will be mailed to the address provided on the Exhibitors' initial entry form. You have until March 30, 2026 to submit an address change via email.
